- + Enigma cipher machines
- + Hundreds of exhibits from the Stasi, BND, KGB and co. Hidden cameras, listening devices and weapons such as a lipstick pistol and bra camera, dead drops, agent radio devices and secret ink equipment.
- + Interactive multimedia installations: morsing messages, cracking the password, searching for bugs, finding microdots, learning observation techniques, the lie detector, escaping through the air duct, cracking the safe and much much more.



Our Collection

The German Spy Museum has gathered a collection of unique objects from the history of international espionage to illustrate the work of secret agents, intelligence agencies and cryptologists. These include rare cipher machines and radio technology from the Second World War and the Cold War, including original Enigma cipher machines.

Fascinating exhibits provide an insight into the exciting world of espionage: hidden cameras, weapons and surveillance technology. Particularly impressive is the collection of miniature cameras, including a CIA key fob camera confiscated by the Stasi.
